

Pastor's Notes

"Whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant. The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve." Mark 10:43-45

Who will be first? As an eldest child, I tended to assume the answer. Then my little sister got a bedroom of her own "first"; I shared mine with one, and then two younger brothers. I was a good student; but others were better than I at certain subjects or tasks. I could sprint with the best of them and often overcame my lousy batting by beating the throw to first base; but I lacked coordination when it came to most team sports. It has been an ongoing process of maturity to accept that I was not placed on this earth to be either "first" or "best." The disciple of Jesus chooses rather to place the talents that God has given them *at the service of God's desires* for God's family.

On this third Sunday of Stewardship, we focus on **the gift of talent**. God has given each of us *specific abilities to different degrees for the good of all*. As one Body in Christ, we are healthy and vibrant to the extent that we encourage each person to develop and share their gifts, celebrating the talents of others and gratefully sharing our own. When we leave the talents of others untapped and place all in the control of a chosen few, however good those few may be at what they do, we are unable to be the church that Jesus calls us to be.

Good stewardship of talent is first about discover: What talents has God given me? and How might these talents best serve others? It is about discerning what God asks me to do and what God asks me <u>not</u> to do so that another might share her or his talents. It is about accepting that God sometimes

asks me to do one thing less; and at other times God asks me to do one thing more. It is surrendering the outcome to God: I do the work of God as *collaborator* rather than as God's substitute or "temp."

St. Francis Xavier Parish offers over 50 ministries through which parishioners are invited to share your talents with the parish community. Our families, the communities around us, and our places of work and play offer many other opportunities to share our talents. Many among us are sharing their talents as parents and caretakers of parents or spouses.

I invite you to set aside some time to review the parish ministries described in the Parish Ministry Guide. If you are interested in learning more, someone from that ministry will welcome a conversation. If you find it is time to step away from a ministry, heed that voice and let us thank you for your past service. If you feel called to change ministries, then follow where God is leading you.

God be praised for all the talents with which God has blessed our faith community! May we continue to grow in our ministry to others and our mission to the local community and larger world.

I am practicing the stewardship of time this weekend through my annual silent eight-day retreat in Sedalia, Colorado. Please pray for me and be assured of my prayers.

Scripture Reflection

Today we sit down and listen to the beginning of the first reading. It is from Isaiah. "The Lord was pleased to crush him in infirmity." Wait a second, did I hear that right. God was happy with suffering. I knew it. When I mess up and end up suffering for it, it is just God's way to make me hurt for doing the wrong thing. It confirms what I thought as a young kid.

When I was young and in school, I would have to take tests or write something down so that I could be graded along with the rest of the students. When I would get my test or paper back, all my incorrect answers were circled. Also circled was any misspellings, because, of course, for it to be right, it had to be spelled right. So in looking at the sheet then, all I would see is my mistakes, not the things that I had answered right.

When I was young, I thought God was like a teacher. Whenever I did something wrong, or did not do what I should have done, God would circle those mistakes and make a list. God, I knew, would ultimately make me suffer for it.

It was not until I was older that the message of Jesus showed me another way. God does not circle things we get wrong, but circles all we get right. He is more interested that we learn to love the good and turn away from the bad. He wants to underline the positive.

So when we hear that the Lord was pleased in the prophet's being crushed, we recognize that it is only a poor translation. The Lord was pleased that the prophet and also Jesus did the right thing. Their suffering came from sin, the evil of our hearts and of this world, not the good or the loving stance of our lives. Like the "Suffering Servant" we may hurt from doing the right thing, but not because God wants us to suffer. Following Jesus is not easy, but it does lead to everlasting life.

World Mission Sunday


Today we join with the Catholic Church across the globe to celebrate World Mission Sunday. This annual second collection provides critical support to communities of faith in some of the most economically disadvantaged regions of our world. Working with limited means, these local churches bear witness to the Gospel amid poverty and turmoil, addressing all forms of material and spiritual need. Today, we stand in solidarity with them through prayerful and financial support.

Who the World Mission Sunday Collection Serves:

- Approximately 75 percent supports efforts of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith to help sustain over 1,000 mission dioceses in Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Pacific Islands.
- Nearly 10 percent supports the work of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association to alleviate poverty, foster Christian unity, and promote interreligious dialogue in the Middle East, Northeast Africa, India, and Eastern Europe.
- About 15 percent supports the operations of the Mission Office of the Archdiocese of Chicago, which builds bridges of love and support between global missionaries and members of the Church in Chicago.

In his message for World Mission Sunday, Pope Francis states that, "No one is so poor as to be unable to give what they have, but first and foremost what they are." Those serving in mission at the global peripheries, especially communities and individuals who follow the command to serve despite their own financial struggles, witness this message of service and self-sacrifice. By joining with them, we in turn bear witness to a message of love and compassion so needed in our world today.



From the Domestic Violence Outreach Ministry

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury and death for women of all socioeconomic, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds, and affects up to 1 in 10 men and 1 in 3 teens. We invite you to join us to raise awareness and stand in solidarity with all those affected by violence.

This month we present a series of survivor stories. Note that these are intended for adult readers. All names have been changed for protection.

Tracey's Story The abuse

I was in my late twenties when I met my ex at the church I attended. We married a year later. He slapped me across the face one time when we were engaged as he didn't like the meal that I cooked. I was dumbfounded but accepted his apologies and excuse of having had a hard day at work. The abuse started a week after we were married and escalated very quickly. Six months into the marriage I asked him for a divorce. He said that if I divorced him he would kill me and kill my parents. I confided in the minister of the church as to what was going on. The minister tried counseling us, but my husband was telling the priest one thing and doing another.

I earned more than him and had to cover all the household expenses. He would also make demands for money from me. If I said no to sex he would force himself on me. He would give me 15 minutes to get home from work. If I were late, he would accuse me of being unfaithful. One time I was late, and an argument broke out. I ran to the bathroom and locked the door. He put his fist through the door. I jumped into the shower recess and he completely smashed it to get to me.

He cut me off from my family and friends and eventually from my church. I became a prisoner in my own home. He destroyed my self-esteem by telling me how worthless I was and continued with the mind games. It got to a stage where I didn't know what the truth was and what was a lie. He stripped me of my dignity and self-respect. My thoughts were scattered and not logical. I thought: I cannot be free, he will hunt me down; this was his only promise to me. I wondered: Is there nowhere to take refuge and shelter? Must I leave my home that I have purchased and paid for myself? Should he continue to enjoy the benefits his life with me affords him? My thoughts would turn to my baby boys: what would be their fate? I lived in fear for my life.

I saw a movie one day, and it was a real story of an abused woman who shot her husband to escape the abuse. I started entertaining the idea of killing him, but I realized that I wouldn't be successful.

How things changed

The change came for me when I made the decision that if I could no longer live like I had been living and if I had to die to be free, then I was willing to pay that price. I decided to succumb to a final beating and present myself to the police and have him charged. On that day he pushed me and I pushed him back, expecting a belting. He then spat in my face and I spat back at him, expecting a belting. But instead he called the police and cried battered husband – he said I was the one abusing him. Luckily, the police didn't believe him and helped me leave.

The police asked me to pack a bag and they tried for about an hour to get us into a women's refuge, but they couldn't get through as the lines were busy. I then said to my ex that if we had to leave our home, I would disconnect the gas and electricity and get a restraining order to get him out. He then agreed to leave. I gave him two weeks to get out. The boys and I went to my parent's home. When he left the house, my parents and I went back, packed up and moved my furniture and possessions to their home. We stayed with them for three years. I rented out my home during that time.

He still had contact with my sons with access at the police station. But incidents were still occurring. There was a time when one of my sons had a graze to his forehead. My ex told the police that I was mishandling the boys. The police officer believed my ex and I had to get a doctor's letter stating that he believed that the boys weren't being mistreated.

My advice to others

When I was going through this abuse I remained silent about what was going on in my home and I believe that it was my silence that enabled him to continue with the abuse. By remaining silent and not telling others what is happening in our homes, we enable the abusers to continue with the abuse. We need to break the silence and expose those who seek to keep us bound in fear and dread.

At the end of the day, every woman who is killed, injured or harmed through domestic violence is someone's daughter.




