



# **Pastor's Notes**

"Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink." Exodus 17:6

"The water I shall give will become in you a spring of water welling up to eternal life." John 4:14

We thirst. Whether in the deserts of life in which we sometimes find ourselves wandering aimlessly, or in the blazing heat of oppression at a well that will provide us with only as much as we can carry. We may grumble in anger; or we may have lost hope that life will ever be any different. Whatever the source of our thirst, do we accept that God alone can quench our deepest thirsts and trust that God is eager to do so? Do we seek the openness of the unnamed woman at the well rather than the self -centered grumbling of the wanderers in the desert? Are we choosing Lenten practices that lead us into honest conversation with Jesus?

\* \* \* \* \*

Last week we implemented several precautions for parish Masses at the direction of the Archdiocese and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. These are in direct response to the outbreak of the coronavirus, and include moving away from physical contact during the Our Father and Sign of Peace, suspending the distribution of the cup at communion, and asking those who normally receive the host on the tongue to switch to reception in the hand. Those with a cold or flu symptoms are encouraged to remain home on Sunday. We will return to our usual procedures after Easter or when advised that it is reasonable to do so.

A few parishioners expressed concern about the passing of baskets for the collection. We have been assured that this is a low-risk practice and is equivalent with touching doorknobs. However, to provide an alternative to those for whom this is a concern, we will temporarily resume the use of the baskets on poles in the main section of the church. We will continue to pass baskets in the east and west transepts. If passing the basket causes you concern, please sit in the main section of the church. I heed those who are elderly or have significant health concerns to act as you deem appropriate for your circumstances. That includes the decision to remain at home on any given Sunday, to come to one of the less attended Masses, and/or to sit in Unity Hall for Mass to lessen contact with others. We can do one another a great service by refusing to engage in "panic talk" that increases the anxieties of those who are sensitive to these emotions. Reasonable precautions are what have been advised to practice at this point. It is an act of compassion to care for one another in our words and actions during this time.

# **Scripture Reflection**



The Samaritan woman probably felt a sense of shame, and went to the well at noon, hoping not to run into anybody in the middle day heat. The Israelites saw the Samaritans as outcasts. Other Samaritans likely looked down on the Samaritan woman, as she was married five times, and was living with someone else. Little did she know that of all the people in Samaria, Jesus was waiting to meet her at the well that day. He came for people just like her that the world considers unworthy.

We may sometimes feel like the Samaritan woman due to our past choices and predicaments. The world may have condemned us for our wrongs. We may have condemned ourselves because of the guilt of past failures. We may also pass judgements and shun others whom we consider as less worthy than us.

"But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Jesus came not for those who are well, but for those who are sick and in need of a doctor. Jesus saw a glimmer of faith in the Samaritan woman, who was also waiting for the Messiah, and lit a fire in her heart. Jesus started with a request to the Samaritan woman, "Give me a drink", and this started the dialogue. He also has a request for each of us, and wants to engage with us, no matter where we are on our journey. If only we would open ourselves to him, he will give us the true "living water" so we "will never thirst" again.

The Samaritan woman "left her water jar" and ran to share the good news about the Messiah with her people. Let us leave our past failures behind, embody the good news in our lives, and bless others with this gift. In times of difficulty, let us not be like the ungrateful Israelites who grumbled against Moses, and failed to recognize the Lord's presence in their "midst". In a special way this Lent, let us embrace and encounter afresh, the One who gives us a "hope that does not disappoint".



# Coronavirus Information From Bishop Ron Hicks & Dr. Jim Rigg

Dear St. Francis Xavier Parish and School Community members,

We have been monitoring the news about the spread of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), particularly the cases identified in the Chicago area. The archdiocese has issued guidelines for worship services based on advice from public health authorities and we have joined with the Holy Father in praying for all affected by this epidemic.

We are writing today to share developments that may have an impact on some archdiocese facilities. The Chicago Department of Public Health (CDPH) has recently confirmed a case of COVID-19 involving a staff member at Vaughn Occupational High School, a Chicago public school. The CDPH has stated that the immediate health risk to the general public from this case remains low. The CDPH recommended that anyone present at Vaughn School between February 25 and March 6 self-quarantine. The CDPH and CPS also advised that:

"People who were *not* at Vaughn between February 25 and March 6 do *not* have restrictions at this time, even if they have been in contact with someone at Vaughn. They can attend work and school, as long as they are not sick.

Based on this guidance, and our own contacts with CDPH and Illinois Department of Public Health we are not closing archdiocese schools where a student or staff member has a connection with Vaughn. We will follow the same guidance for other cases of secondary family exposure. Students and staff with a family member who might have had contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case will be allowed to attend work and school, as long as they are not sick.

The health and safety of our Parish and School communities is our first priority. We ask that you join us in protecting our community by following the guidance of public health authorities and your medical provider. It is critically important that our community share only trusted sources of information.

As a faith community, we must respond with compassion and prayer to everyone affected by the COVID-19 epidemic around the world, particularly those who do not have access to medical and community support. We will include these brothers and sisters in our prayers for the sick and those who have died. Please keep our community in your prayers and know that we are praying for you.

# **Updated Mass Guidelines From the Archdiocese**

The Archdiocese of Chicago has issued guidelines to be implemented immediately in all parish Masses within the Archdiocese.

For the remainder of Lent we are making the following changes:

✓ All holy water fonts will remain empty. You still can make the Sign of the Cross as you enter and leave church.

Kefrain from holding hands during the Our Father. Instead, extend your arms forward, palms up, in a gesture of offering.

Refrain from physical contact during the Sign of Peace. You may nod, smile, wave, or use the American Sign Language gesture for peace.

Refrain from receiving the Eucharist on the tongue. Reverently practice the gesture of receiving in open hands.

We temporarily will discontinue sharing the Eucharist from the cup. If this poses any difficulties for you, please speak with Fr. Bill.

You are not obligated to attend Mass when you are ill. At these times, the most charitable thing may be to remain at home.

All are reminded that the best prevention measures are careful hand washing (at least 20 seconds), not touching the face, and covering all sneezes and coughs with a tissue or elbow. Thank you in advance as we demonstrate our care and concern for one another.






