Pastor's Notes

"You are not far from the kingdom of God."

Mark 12:34

A scholar of religious law asks Jesus, which of the thousands of commandments that guided the Jewish way of life at the time was most important. The scribe accepts the response of Jesus, which is to love God above all else and to love one's neighbor as oneself. In fact, he displays such depth of understanding that Jesus is moved to tell him that he is close to dwelling in the kingdom of God. Jesus reduces the many rules and regulations of religion to words so simple as to make them easy to understand but challenging to live. We need only love, for love is of God and love never fails. Making the choice to love too often seems beyond our reach. Yet striving to make that choice, each time we face it, brings us into the presence of God.

This week. Christians take time to remember and celebrate those who have gone before us in death and whom we hope to see once more in God's kingdom. Halloween, or All Hallows Eve, is rooted in Celtic and Roman traditions that honored the ancestors; over time, many Christian cultures adopted these for the night before the Feast of All Saints. traditions, favorite foods of deceased family members were placed on a table outside the door of of the house on this night, on which ancestors were thought to visit their descendants. Children soon took up the practice of dressing up as ghosts of the ancestors, going door to door to enjoy the "treats" that had been set out for the ancestors. If a family failed to leave anything outside the door, they might suffer some "trick" from the children who passed their door. For Christians, the costumes of ghosts and skeletons became a way to laugh at death in the face of Christ's victory over death.

Latin American traditions find their roots in the traditions of the Aztecs and other indigenous peoples; these, too were adopted and adapted by Christians. They celebrate and give thanks for their deceased loved ones on the first two

days of November. Each family sets up a table, or altar, in the home, on which they place photos, objects, memories, and favorite foods of those who have died. On November 2, where possible, the family goes to the cemetery and shares a feast on the graves of their loved ones; they also share memories, sing songs, and give thanks for the blessings of the lives of those who have gone before. Candy in the shape of skulls, skeleton figures, and other symbols of death are part of the day; they mock death in the light of the Resurrection. It is not a day of mourning, but rather of joyful and grateful remembrance.

In America today, the skeletons and ghosts of ancient traditions have been joined by a variety of ghoulish creatures; a tradition of dressing as one of the saints has been replaced by superheroes, public figures, and characters from storybooks or movies. However, we continue the tradition of coming together on November 2nd to remember and celebrate the people in our lives who have gone before us in death. At Mass, we remember by name those who have left us during this past year. We comfort those who still grieve their loss, and we share the stories and give thanks for the blessings we received from those who await us in heaven.

What a marvelous treat! And with no tricks at all. Just an opportunity to laugh in the face of death and celebrate the lives of those gone before us. Happy Halloween!

Weekend Mass Protocols at St. Francis Xavier!

The CDC recommends wearing masks in indoor, public spaces, following evidence that the COVID delta strain can spread rapidly even among fully vaccinated individuals.

- Masks are <u>required for everyone</u> over age 2, regardless of vaccination status.
- We invite everyone to sing with your mask in place! Pick up a bulletin as you enter church for the words to the hymns. As you leave, place any bulletins you are not taking home in the recycle baskets at each door.
- Please wait for an usher to invite your pew to come forward for communion. With your mask in place, receive the host in your hand and move six feet to the side before removing your mask to consume the host.
- <u>All</u> church doors remain open for all worshippers.
- Unity Hall remains open to families with small children to offer a remote viewing option on Saturdays at 5PM and Sundays at 9AM and 11AM. This is only for families with small children and no cold symptoms.
- Every other pew in the back of church and in the east transept is <u>not</u> available for seating. These areas provide social distance for parents with infants, those with immune issues, and those not yet comfortable being closer than six feet. All other pews are available for general seating.
- Please avoid physical contact with those not of your own household, especially during the Sign of Peace. A nod or a wave is always appropriate.



COMMEMORATING CARDINAL JOSEPH BERNARDIN ON THE TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY OF HIS DEATH

Cardinal Joseph Bernardin, beloved and esteemed Archbishop of Chicago, died on November 14, 1996. He had arrived in Chicago in August 1982 and served here for fourteen years. During his time as Archbishop, he left an enduring mark on the Catholic Church in Chicago as well as on the civic community. He also had significant impact and influence on the nation and the world at large. The Archdiocese of Chicago is preparing to remember Cardinal Bernardin in two events at the beginning of November.

On November 1 at Holy Name Cathedral (750 North State Street) at 7pm, there will be a commemoration of Cardinal Bernardin's contribution to the Church and to our civic life. The evening is entitled "Now More Than Ever: The Enduring Prophetic Voice and Legacy of Cardinal Joseph Bernardin Twenty-five Years after His Death." Five speakers will briefly address aspects of his legacy and its continuing relevance in today's world.

Steven Millies (the USCCB 1982 pastoral letter on peace, an initiative that Cardinal Bernardin directed and that had national and international ramifications);

Father J. Cletus Kiley (Cardinal Bernardin's contribution to a renewed vision of ministers and ministry in the Church and the ways he was a forerunner in addressing the abuse crisis);

Andrew McKenna (Cardinal Bernardin's commitment to investing in the future through Catholic education);

Rabbi Wendi Geffen (Cardinal Bernardin's efforts to build ecumenical and interfaith relationships);

Cardinal Blase Cupich (Cardinal Bernardin's consistent ethic of life).

The evening promises to be an exercise of grateful memory for what Cardinal Joseph Bernardin has left us. It will also be a summons for us to continue his legacy that retains even more value today than in the time he was among us. On the following day, November 2, again at Holy Name Cathedral, the annual memorial Mass for deceased bishops and priests of the Archdiocese of Chicago will be celebrated at noon. At that Mass, Cardinal Bernardin will be specially remembered.




Who Are the Victims?

¹Twenty-five percent of American women and eight percent of American men will experience domestic violence at some point in their lives. Children are very often witnesses and victims themselves. This statistic does not include the vast number of unreported incidents of violence. There is no evidence that the prevalence of domestic violence is any lower within faith communities.

What is Domestic Violence?

²Domestic violence (also known as spouse abuse, partner violence, intimate-partner violence, battering, and numerous other terms) is a pattern of coercion used by one person to exert power and control



Actual or threatened physical harm, psychological abuse, and forced sexual contact; Economic control; Social isolation; Destruction of a victim's property, keepsakes, or personal possessions; Abuse of animals/pets; Misuse of divine beings or religious beliefs, practices, teachings and traditions as well as asserting male superiority and attributing abusive behavior to cultural traditions.

These behaviors can occur in any combination, sporadically or chronically, over a period of up to several decades.

Most victims of domestic violence are women in heterosexual relationships. Men in heterosexual relationships can also be victims of domestic violence, in addition to both women and men in same-sex relationships. Regardless of culture, race, religion, or socio-economic class, approximately 90 percent of reported domestic violence cases involve men who abuse women.


Church League Boys Basketball is Back!

CARING FOR LOVED ONES AT LIFE'S END

Invite God In: Pope Francis has said that "praying in difficult situations is like opening the door to the Lord, in order that he might enter." The dying process is a sacred time—a final season to seek closure in this life and prepare for the next in the hope of sharing in Christ's Resurrection.

Listen: Try to discover your loved one's values and how best to honor his or her wishes. This requires true empathy.

Inform Yourself: Seek to understand the Catholic Church's teaching on end-of-life care, which can help you provide authentically loving support that respects life.

Be Steadfast in Compassion: As Pope Francis reminds us, "Compassion means 'suffer with'." Your friend or family member will likely face ups and downs. Recognize these as part of a natural process. Surround him or her with love, support, and companionship that are "anchored in unconditional respect for their human dignity, beginning with respect for the inherent value of their lives.

Help Them Achieve Closure: Help your family member or friend define the unfinished personal projects, financial concerns, unresolved relationships, or other matters that occupy his or her mind.

Provide Opportunities for Resolution: Ira Byock, a hospice medical director, illustrates in his book *The 4 Most Important Things*** how saying "I love you," "I'm sorry," "I forgive you," and "Thank you" can promote much-needed healing during the dying process. Consider offering to invite a priest to hear his or her confession and to administer the Eucharist and the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, all of which heal the soul and prepare us to meet the Lord.

Reminisce: Think of small comforts you can provide that would spark meaningful memories, like special photos or mementos.

Provide a Peaceful Presence: There comes a time of natural withdrawal from surroundings when dying persons may lose interest in many activities that used to be enjoyable. Your own quiet, patient presence can provide important support as your loved one prepares emotionally and spiritually for his or her passing.

Show Tenderness: Those who are dying remain in need of the tenderness of personal human contact.

Bear Their Transition Patiently: Transition, the time immediately preceding death, may bring rapid physical changes, such as in breathing patterns, as well as changes in mental or emotional states. Try to be patient and allow the "how" and "when" of death to be between God and your loved one.


